◆ Japan and Sweden joined the U.S. and Britain on Monday in warning citizens about traveling in Europe because of concerns about a terror attack. Britain's Foreign Office warned travelers to France and Germany that the terror threat there is high. Security officials say terrorists may be plotting attacks in public places in Europe with assault weapons.

• Pakistani intelligence officials say five German citizens are believed to have been killed in an American missile strike close to the Afghan border. Sources say the Germans were in the region for terrorist training.

• A federal jury in Alabama has indicted 11 people, including a casino owner and four state senators, in connection with a scheme to buy and sell votes to get electronic bingo legalized in the state. An employee of a lobbying firm admitted she offered \$2 million to a senator at the direction of her boss.

• Medical reports say holding your laptop computer on your lap can generate enough heat to lead to "toasted skin syndrome," an unusual-looking mottled skin condition. It's generally harmless but can cause permanent skin darkening and could lead to skin cancer.
