TODAY IN HISTORY - June 20

1863 – West Virginia became the 35th state. It was originally part of Virginia, which had seceded from the Union during the Civil War. The western counties in Virginia supported the North and declared their independence from Virginia. Eventually, they became West Virginia.

1867 – The U.S. purchased the territory of Alaska from Russia for \$7 million, or about 2¢ per acre.

1924 – Certified Guitar Picker Chet Atkins was born. **1939** – W2XBS (later WCBS-TV) in New York City televised the first TV operetta. *Pirates of Penzance*, composed by Gilbert and Sullivan, was presented to a very small viewing audience. Television was a new, experimental medium at the time.

1945 – Singer Anne Murray was born in Canada. Her first big hit was "Snowbird."

1977 - Oil began flowing through the 789-mile-long Alaska pipeline.
