◆ The FBI is continuing to search for four young men who have been mysteriously missing for days from Bucks County, Pennsylvania. Nineteen-year-old Jimi Tar Patrick has been missing since last Wednesday, while 22-year-old Mark Sturgis, 19-year-old Dean Finocchiaro and 21-year-old Tom Meo all disappeared last Friday.

• A Virginia man faces up to a year in prison and a \$100,000 fine after he pleaded guilty to killing a bald eagle, first by shooting the bird of prey and then running it over with an all-terrain vehicle. 62-year-old Allen H. Thacker said he was upset that the eagle had been hunting and catching fish from his pond.

The death toll from the Marine Corps KC-130 aircraft that crashed in Leflore County, Mississippi on Monday is now at 16 service members. The flight departed from Marine Corps Air Station Cherry Point, North Carolina and was heading to California.

• The United States has for the first time successfully carried out an intermediate-range missile intercept test using the Terminal High Altitude Area Defense (THAAD) system. An intermediaterange ballistic missile target was air-launched by a U.S. Air Force C-17 aircraft over the Pacific Ocean north of Hawaii. That missile was detected and tracked by a THAAD system in Kodiak, Alaska, which ultimately intercepted the target.

• President Donald Trump will no longer be visiting London in his first year as president. A "scheduling conflict" is the reason behind the change. The White House has gotten in touch with the British government to iron out plans for a visit in 2018.

TODAY IN HISTORY - JULY 12

100 B.C. - Julius Caesar was born in Rome.

1543 - England's King Henry VIII married his sixth and last wife, Catherine Parr.

1690 - Protestant forces led by William of Orange defeated the Roman Catholic army of James II at the Battle of the Boyne in Ireland.

- 1862 Congress authorized the Medal of Honor
- **1895** Broadway lyricist Oscar Hammerstein II was born in New York City.
- 1908 Comedian Milton Berle was born Mendel Berlinger in New York City.
- **1972** George McGovern won the Democratic presidential nomination at the party's convention in Miami Beach.

1984 - Democratic presidential candidate Walter F. Mondale named New York Congresswoman Geraldine A. Ferraro his running mate, making her the first woman to run on a major party ticket.

2006 - Hezbollah guerrillas kidnapped two Israeli soldiers and killed eight others in a cross-border raid; Israel sent ground troops into Lebanon in response.

One of literature's most famous private eyes, Sam Spade, made his mark in *The Maltese Falcon*, first, in the 1930s in the pages of Dashiell Hammett's book, and then, in the same titled film, the most famous version directed by John Huston, in 1941. But, it wasn't until this day in 1946 that the gumshoe, Sam Spade became a household name.
