◆ JUDGE CLOSES BLUE COVE PERMANENTLY

McMinn County Circuit Court Judge Michael Sharp has issued a permanent injunction against Blue Cove Hideaway, calling it a "public nuisance." The judge ordered that Blue Cove be permanently closed. Two people have drowned in recent years at Blue Cove, which is a former rock quarry on County Road 116. In addition police have investigated multiple complaints of underage drinking and illegal drug use at Blue Cove. The owner, Charles Womac, recently locked two McMinn County deputies inside the Blue Cove gates and refused to let them leave for almost 30 minutes. Judge Sharp said he ordered the owners to close Blue Cove because the activities there present a danger to the public's health, safety, and welfare.

◆ TBI INVESTIGATING TEENAGER'S DEATH

Kelby Fritts, age 18, a recent Salutatorian graduate of Polk \checkmark County High School, died last Monday, August 6th, at an area hospital. Kelby was attending an event in the Ocoee area when she began having some unknown medical issues, according to investigators. The TBI has been asked to determine what caused the 18-year old to start having the medical problems at the event and later die at the hospital. Her Obituary is on page 2.

Tennessee's First Execution since 2009

Tennessee carried out its first execution since 2009 last Thursday evening. Billy Ray Irick died by lethal injection for the rape and murder of a seven-year-old girl in 1985. His last meal was a burger combo. Witnesses say condemned inmate Billy Ray Irick at first signaled he would have no last words, but then gave a brief statement to those watching. Irick, who was convicted of the child's 1985 rape and murder in 1986, told those present "I'm really sorry" shortly before he was executed at a prison in Nashville. The execution came after a final appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court was turned down. Attorney General Herbert Slattery said, "The death penalty is constitutional and it is the law of the State of Tennessee. It has taken decades and multiple court hearings, but justice was finally served for the murder and aggravated rape of 7-year-old Paula Dyer. Justice was delayed too long for this little girl and her family. I hope tonight's lawful execution in some way eases the heartache Paula's family has lived with and brings a degree of closure to a chapter of their lives that has been indescribably difficult."
