Tom Hughes, Executive Vice President of Peoples Bank of East Tennessee, has worked for nearly two years to get his uncle's World War II medals replaced. His uncle, Robert Aubrey Hughes, was killed on December 19th in a B-24 Liberator bomber. His medals were stolen from Tom's grandparents' home years ago in Mississippi. Congressman Chuck Fleischmann was able to secure replacement medals. Last Friday, he presented the medals to Tom and his sister, Vicki Hughes Everett, at Fleischmann's Athens office. #### TODAY IN HISTORY—JANUARY 21<sup>st</sup>

1824 - Confederate General "Stonewall" Jackson was born. He got his nickname at the first Battle of Bull Run. Jackson's brigade faced overwhelming odds, but it formed a strong line and held its ground. One of his fellow generals exclaimed: "There is Jackson standing like a stone wall."

1908 - Smoking by women became illegal. The Sullivan Ordinance was enacted in New York City, but, from pictures we've seen, some women continued to smoke even though it was against the law.

1927 - The first opera to be broadcast over a national radio network was presented in Chicago, IL. Listeners heard selections

1940 - Golfing great Jack Nicklaus was born.

**1941** - Opera singer Plácido Domingo was born. He and John Denver teamed up for a hit record titled "Perhaps Love."

**1942** - Singer/songwriter Mac Davis was born. His hit records include "Stop and Smell the Roses" and "Baby Don't Get Hooked On Me." He wrote such songs as "In the Ghetto," "Watching Scotty Grow," "I Believe in Music," and "Memories."

**1976** - Concorde super-sonic jet service between New York and London began via British Airways.
