# **McMinn Confirms Covid-19 Case**

McMinn County Mayor John Gentry has declared a state of emergency in response to the first confirmed case of Covid-19 infection in McMinn County. The patient in McMinn County is resting at home under quarantine. The Tennessee Department of Health is in contact with the patient and is tracing their recent movements to determine with whom they have been in close contact. State law grants county mayors the authority to declare a state of emergency for a period of seven days. At the end of each period, they may reassess and declare an emergency for successive seven day terms. Entrances to the Courthouse and Annex are now restricted to emergencies only which will be determined by the office holder only after being contacted by telephone or other electronic means. The Bicentennial Park and the Eureka Trail remain open for individual outdoor exercise, however no more than 10 individuals will be allowed on the playground at one time. All in-person courts have been suspended under order of the Tennessee Supreme Court. Everyone must call the Circuit Court Clerk to check the status of their case.

### **Area & State News**

✓ An executive order by Governor Bill Lee has given the green light for residents to delay getting their vehicle registration and driver's license renewed due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The governor's order delays vehicle registration renewals set to expire between March 12 and May 18, 2020 to June 15, 2020. The order also suspends the expiration dates on valid driver licenses and Class ID photo identification for 6 months from the expiration date. This extension applies to driver's license and ID's set to expire between March 12 and May 18, 2020.

✓ Tennessee lawmakers have shut down their 2020 session early in reaction to widespread disruptions caused by the coronavirus after passing a dramatically reduced spending plan for the upcoming year. The overhauled \$39.8 billion spending plan approved Thursday is nearly \$1 billion less than what Governor Bill Lee originally proposed earlier this year. Legislative sessions could

begin again as early as June 1.

✓ The Tennessee House and Senate have passed an amended bill to waive student testing and attendance requirements because of uncertainty that students will be back in the classroom anytime soon. The new proposal will immediately waive TNReady tests, end of-course examinations (Districts may voluntarily administer assessments), 180-day instructional requirement, and civics testing requirements for graduating seniors.

✓ The Madison Avenue Pharmacy in Athens is now restricting all access to their store. They are offering free delivery to the greater Athens area 9a-7p M-F and 9a-2p on Saturday. Drive-thru and curbside service is available. Call 746-2626 when you get to the pharmacy and someone will come greet you.

- ◆ Due to the nature of the COVIC-19 pandemic, Athens Utilities Board will close their lobby effective Monday, March 23rd until further notice. If you need to speak with customer service or need assistance with anything, call (423) 745-4501. Bills may be paid by phone with credit card, or paid through the drive through during business hours, Monday-Thursday 7:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. or by using the night drop after hours. Bills may also be paid online at www.aub.org. IT support will be available if needed. There are no additional charges by paying on line or by phone, and additional staff will be available to take payments over the phone. AUB will make a decision on reopening the lobby when they feel it is safe for their customers and employees.
- ◆ The Etowah City Hall will close until further notice. Payments may be made by using the drop box located in the front of the building, by phone or online. Staff will be available to accept payments by phone. ### TODAY IN HISTORY - MARCH 23rd

- 1775 Patrick Henry delivered an address to the Virginia Provincial Convention in which he is said to have declared, "Give me liberty, or give me death!"
- **1806 -** Explorers Meriwether Lewis and William Clark, having reached the Pacific coast, began their journey back east. **1914 -** The first installment of "The Perils of Pauline," the silent film serial starring Pearl White, premiered in the greater New York City area.
- **1933** The German Reichstag adopted the Enabling Act, which effectively granted Adolf Hitler dictatorial powers.
- **1942** The first Japanese-Americans evacuated by the U.S. Army during World War II arrived at an internment camp in Manzanar, California.
- **1956 -** Pakistan became an Islamic republic.
- 1965 America's first two-person space mission took place as Gemini 3 blasted off with astronauts Virgil I. "Gus" Grissom and John W. Young aboard for a nearly 5-hour flight.
- 1983 President Ronald Reagan first proposed developing technology to intercept incoming enemy missiles; an idea that came to be known as the Strategic Defense Initiative. Dr. Barney Clark, recipient of a Jarvik permanent artificial heart, died at the University of Utah Medical Center after 112 days with the device.
- 1994 Aeroflot Flight 593, an Airbus A310, crashed in Siberia with the loss of all 75 people on board; it turned out the teenage son of a pilot who was allowed to sit at the controls accidentally disengaged the autopilot, causing the jetliner to plunge to the ground.
- **1998 -** "Titanic" tied an Academy Awards record by winning 11 Oscars, including best picture, director (James Cameron) and song ("My Heart Will Go On").
- **2003** During the Iraq War, a U.S. Army maintenance convoy was ambushed in Nasiriyah; 11 soldiers were killed, including Pfc. Lori Ann Piestewan; six were captured, including Pfc. Jessica Lynch, who was rescued on April 1, 2003.
