

Coronavirus Update

As of Tuesday evening, the Tennessee Department of Health reported the number of cases of coronavirus in the state had reached 4,138. There have been 72 deaths statewide. The number of cases in McMinn County has remained at 3 for the past two weeks. A total of 257 people have been tested in McMinn County, and 254 tests came back negative. Meigs County reports 2 cases, Polk County has 3, Monroe County has 6, and Bradley County has 25.

The Etowah City School is having a parade on Thursday. The parade will be held in conjunction with the bus food delivery distribution program. Englewood Tower Makes Register

The Englewood Water Tower is one of nine Tennessee sites to be added to the National Register of Historic Places. The 144-foot

water tower is an iconic feature of the community. It is located prominently just outside of the business district. The town of Englewood showcases the tower on its web page. When the Depression-era Public Works Administration program offered funding to build a public water system for the town, 97% of the community approved. The water tower was erected in 1937, using the most advanced design available, which combined an elliptical bottom with a conical top. The new system not only supplied the community, but it helped in reviving Englewood by bringing in new industry. The water tower is no



longer used by the town. A local preservation group has been established to preserve the structure.

TODAY IN HISTORY - APRIL 8th

1513 - Explorer Ponce de Leon landed at what is now St. Augustine, Florida, to search for the "Fountain of Youth." 1864 - The United States Senate passed, 38-6, the 13th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution abolishing slavery. The House of Representatives passed it in January 1865; the amendment was ratified and adopted in December 1865.

1909 - The city of Etowah was chartered. The city was built as a railroad town. The word "Etowah" means "muddy water."

1938 - Singer and actress Connie Stevens was born. Her biggest hit record was "Sixteen Reasons."

1941 - Singer Peggy Lennon (of the Lennon Sisters) was born.

1952 - President Harry Truman ordered government seizure of the steel industry to avoid a general strike. The Supreme Court later ruled that Truman had overstepped his authority, opening the way for a seven-week strike by steelworkers.

1961 - "Lawrence of Arabia" won the Oscar for best picture at the Academy Awards; Gregory Peck won best actor for "To Kill a Mockingbird" while Anne Bancroft received best actress honors for "The Miracle Worker."

1961 - A suspected bomb exploded aboard the passenger liner MV Dara in the Persian Gulf, causing it to sink; 238 of the 819 people aboard were killed.

1974 - Hank Aaron of the Atlanta Braves hit his 715th career home run in a game against the Los Angeles Dodgers, breaking Babe Ruth's record.

2018 - Patrick Reed won the Masters golf tournament for his first victory in a major, turning back late challenges from Rickie Fowler and Jordan Spieth.
