Covid-19 Virus Update

There has been another death at the Life Care Center of Athens. Life Care officials say nine patients have now died. Those deaths are now reflected in the official total from the Tennessee Department of Health. As of Tuesday afternoon, McMinn County has had 122 cases of the coronavirus, with 32 patients recovered and nine deaths. For the state of Tennessee as a whole, there was a big jump from Monday in total cases to 16,111 and 265 deaths.

Starr Regional Resumes Elective Surgery

Starr Regional Medical Center says it is taking the appropriate steps to safely resume some elective and non-urgent surgeries and procedures that were previously rescheduled out of an abundance of caution amid the coronavirus pandemic. The decision to reschedule procedures when clinically appropriate was made in accordance with federal and state guidance, and aimed to help preserve critical resources in the event of a surge of COVID-19 patients in the community. Hospital CEO John McLain says resuming these important services is an essential component of meeting the community's health needs. He says as the work gradually gets underway in the hospital again, they remain committed to conserving critical supplies, being vigilant in the fight against COVID-19, and ensuring that the hospital is a safe place for all patients, providers, and employees. McLain says the hospital will initially focus on scheduling patients with more timesensitive health needs. Patients who are scheduled and approved for procedures must meet specific requirements, including passing standard COVID-19 screenings. Surgical patients also will be asked to practice "safer at home" behaviors for seven days prior to their procedure, check their temperatures twice a day and report temperatures over 100 to their doctor, and undergo testing for COVID-19. Starr Regional Medical Center will continue to screen and mask everyone who enters the facility and maintain a zero-visitor protocol for the foreseeable future.
