Another Big Jump in Virus Cases

The state of Tennessee saw an increase of 2,273 cases of COVID-19 in the past 24 hours, bringing the total number of cases in the state to 69,061. Deaths increased by 16 and have reached 767. McMinn County's cases to date are 313 with 97 active cases and 19 deaths. Bradley County is reporting 1,096 cases, with 479 active cases and 6 deaths. Monroe County's total of cases of COVID-19 to date is 162, with 39 active cases and 6 deaths. Meigs County has had 40 cases, with 10 still active. Polk County's total is 61, with 20 active cases. There have not been any deaths in Polk and Meigs counties.

VIRUS-RELATED NEWS

✓ Tennessee Health Commissioner, Dr. Lisa Piercey, says she plans to send her kids back to school next month. Dr. Piercey cautions that it is "almost inevitable" that COVID-19 will creep into schools and there will be infections, either students or staff or both.
✓ The University of Tennessee says multiple athletes have tested

positive for COVID-19, including football players. The news comes just a day after the Southeastern Conference announced it would be delaying the start to volleyball, cross-country, and soccer until the end of August as it continues to assess the risk COVID-19 poses on athletes in the upcoming fall season.

✓ Walmart Stores nationwide will require customers to wear face masks beginning next Monday, July 20th. Starbucks is also requiring customers to wear face coverings.

TODAY IN HISTORY - JULY 16th

1790 - Congress designated the District of Columbia as the permanent seat of the U.S. government. **1872** - Norwegian explorer Roald Amundsen was born. He discovered the South Pole in 1911. **1935** - The first parking meters in the U.S. were installed in Okla-

homa City.

1945 - The first test of the atomic bomb was conducted at a supersecret base near Alamogordo, New Mexico. The bomb was nick-named "Fat Boy." A few weeks later, World War II was hastened to an end when U.S. planes dropped atomic bombs on two Japanese cities

1965 - Country singer Craig Morgan was born. One of his biggest hits is "That's What I Love About Sunday."

1969 - Apollo 11, the first moon-landing mission, was launched from the Kennedy Space Center in Florida. Aboard were astronauts Neil Armstrong, Edwin "Buzz" Aldrin, and Michael Collins.

1980 - Ronald Reagan was unanimously nominated as the Republican candidate for president at the G-O-P National Convention in Detroit

1981 - Jack Nicklaus played his worst round of professional golf. He scored a 13-over-par 83 at the British Open. He came back the next

day, however, and whipped the field with a four-under-par 66. **1999** - John F. Kennedy Jr., his wife, Carolyn, and her sister died when the single-engine plane Kennedy was piloting plunged into the Atlantic Ocean near Martha's Vineyard, Mass. **2004** - Martha Stewart was sentenced to five months in prison and five months of home confinement by a federal judge for lying about a

WEDNESDAY'S MARKET REPORT

U.S. equities ended the day higher on more positive news about a coronavirus vaccine. Industrials led the rally again. In economic news, the Fed's beige book showed increased economic activity. Goldman Sachs released better-than-expected revenue on increased investment-banking and trading volumes. U.S. Treasury prices dropped.

The Dow Jones Industrial Average was up 228 points or 9% to 26,871. The Standard & Poor's 500 Index was up 29 points or 9% to 3,227, and the NASDAQ Composite Index was up 62 points or 6% to 10,550.

In bond markets, the 30-year Treasury yield traded higher at 1.34%, and the 10-year Treasury yield traded higher at 63%.

In commodity markets, the spot price of gold rose \$0.50 to \$1,813.90, and the price of crude oil rose \$0.70 to \$40.99.
