Governor Issues New Restrictions

Governor Bill Lee has announced new social gathering restrictions while still refusing to implement a mask mandate. The governor calls Tennessee "ground zero" in the COVID-19 battle. He's urging Tennesseans not to gather with people outside their immediate households during the Christmas and New Year's holidays. Instead of a mask mandate, the governor signed an executive order limiting public gatherings to 10 people. However, places of worship, weddings, and funerals are exempt. He did encourage Houses of Worship to utilize virtual or online services and gatherings. He also encouraged weddings and funerals to be postponed or attended only by close family members. The governor's executive order continues through January 19th, 2021.

Meantime, the president of the Tennessee Medical Association says the governor should have ordered a statewide mask mandate due to the increasing COVID-19 crisis. Dr. M. Kevin Smith says the physicians have consistently recommended that mask requirement orders be issued in all counties with over 10 new cases per 100,000 population per day. He says the best county in Tennessee at present has over 80 new cases per 100,000 population per day over the past seven days.

Tennessee Health Commissioner Dr. Lisa Piercey says a Christmas surge of COVID-19 cases "will completely break our hospitals." Dr. Piercey says many hospitals still have capacity for COVID patients, but the critical need is for nurses.



TODAY IN HISTORY - December 22nd

1808 - Ludwig van Beethoven's Symphony No. 5 in C minor, Op. 67, Symphony No. 6 in F major, Op. 68, and Piano Concerto No. 4 in G major, Op. 58, had their world premieres in Vienna, Austria.

1894 - French army officer Alfred Dreyfus was convicted of treason in a court-martial that triggered worldwide charges of anti-Semitism. (Dreyfus was eventually vindicated.)

1941 - British Prime Minister Winston Churchill arrivéd in Washington for a wartime conference with President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

1944 - During the World War II Battle of the Bulge, U.S. Brig. Gen. Anthony C. McAuliffe rejected a German demand for surrender, writing "Nuts!" in his official reply.

1968 - Julie Nixon married David Eisenhower in a private ceremony in New York.

1989 - Romanian President Nicolae Ceausescu, the last of Eastern Europe's hard-line Communist rulers, was toppled from power in a popular uprising. Playwright Samuel Beckett died in Paris at age 83.

1991 - The body of Marine Lt. Col. William R. Higgins, an American hostage slain by his terrorist captors, was recovered after it had been dumped along a highway in Lebanon.

1992 - A Libyan Boeing 727 jetliner crashed after a midair collision with a MiG fighter, killing all 157 aboard the jetliner, and both crew members of the fighter jet.

2001 - Richard C. Reid, a passenger on an American Airlines flight from Paris to Miami, tried to ignite explosives in his shoes, but was subdued by flight attendants and fellow passengers. (Reid is serving a life sentence in federal prison.)
Hamid Karzai (HAH'-mihd KAHR'-zeye) was sworn in as prime minister of Afghanistan's interim government.

2008 - Five Muslim immigrants accused of scheming to massacre U.S. soldiers at Fort Dix were convicted of conspiracy

in Camden, N.J. (Four were later sentenced to life in prison; one received a 33-year sentence.)

2010 - President Barack Obama signed a law allowing homosexuals for the first time in history to serve openly in America's military, repealing the "don't ask, don't tell" policy of former President Bill Clinton.
