Gov. Lee Signs Bills

Governor Bill Lee recently signed into law two bills passed by the General Assembly this year. The first bill bans transgender athletes from participating in female college sports. The Governor has said in the past that if transgender athletes are allowed to participate in female sports that it would destroy women's sports. It goes into effect the first day of July. The second bill will strictly regulate the dispensing of abortion pills. It will include penalties on doctors who violate the new law. It will require a medical clinician to be physically present when a woman takes an abortion pill. Critics say the law will easily be ineffective because the federal government allows mail delivery nationwide of the pills. The law doesn't take effect until January 1, 2023.

MONDAY'S MARKET REPORT Markets continued last week's sell-off, as investors look to surging inflation and monetary-policy tightening. Technology continues to be the hardest hit sector. The NASDAQ fell more than 4%, while energy was also negative as the price of oil falls. U.S. 10-year bonds rose to 3.185%. At the closing bell, The Dow Jones Industrial Average was down 653.67 to 32,245.70. The Standard & Poor's 500 Index was down 132.10 to 3,991.24, and the NASDAQ Composite Index was down 521.41 to 11,623.25.

TODAY IN HISTORY - MAY 10th

- 1838 John Wilkes Booth, the man who assassinated President Abraham Lincoln, was born.
- **1863 -** Confederate General Stonewall Jackson died. He had been accidentally shot by his own soldiers eight days earlier.
- **1865 -** Confederate President Jefferson Davis was captured by Union troops near Irwinville, Georgia. He spent the next two years in prison.
- **1869 -** The "golden spike" was driven at Promontory Point, Utah, connecting the Union Pacific and the Central Pacific rail lines to form America's first trans-continental railroad.
- **1899 -** Singer, dancer, and actor Fred Astaire was born in Omaha, Nebraska. He starred in such Broadway shows as "The Bandwagon" and starred in numerous movies with his dancing partner, Ginger Rogers.
- **1924 -** J. Edgar Hoover was named acting director of the Bureau of Investigation (later known as the Federal Bureau of Investigation, or FBI).
- **1908** The first Mother's Day observance took place during a church service in Grafton, Virginia.
- **1924 -** J. Edgar Hoover was appointed head of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.
- **1933 -** The Nazis staged massive public book burnings in Germany.
- 1941 Danny Rapp, leader of the group "Danny & the Juniors," was born. Their biggest hit was "At The Hop."
- **2011** It was announced that Microsoft had closed a deal to purchase the internet phone service Skype for \$8.5 billion.
- **2013 -** In New York, NY, crane operators hoisted the final pieces of the spire atop One World Trade Center (formerly called the Freedom Tower).
- **2016 -** NASA announced that it's Kepler mission had verified 1,284 new planets. This was the single largest finding of planets to date.
