

Etowah Man Charged in Fatal Shooting

An Etowah man has been charged in the death of his father after a shooting last Thursday evening. According to Sheriff Joe Guy, on Thursday, December 28th, Deputies with the McMinn County Sheriff's Office responded to a residence on County Road 475 near Etowah to a report of an individual with a fatal gunshot wound. Upon arrival, they made contact with Jason Dillard, 46, who also lived at the residence, as well as Haley Martin who had been outside, and Annette Dillard who lives next door. Deputies then went into the residence and found the victim, identified as Roger Dillard, 68, who is Jason Dillard's father, deceased and lying in the living room with a fatal gunshot wound. Deputies secured the scene as Lt. Detective Jared Price, Detective Amber Cook, and Detective Kevin Gray arrived and immediately began an investigation. Tony Isom with the District Attorney General's Office and TBI Agent Cameron Cordell also assisted. A firearm was recovered from the scene, some distance from the victim. "Over the next several days, as the investigation progressed and an autopsy was performed, it became clear that the situation



did not reflect that of a suicide," said Sheriff Guy. "Rather, it became evident that Jason Dillard had fired the shot which resulted in the death of his father, Roger Dillard, during an argument they were having." On December 31st, Jason Dillard was taken into custody and booked into the McMinn County Jail for Criminal Homicide in the 2nd Degree. He remains in custody on a \$200,000 bond. More New Laws

It was a busy year in Nashville and a lot of bills were passed, some of which took effect January 1st, including one law that hopes to keep drunk drivers off the roads. SB0258 passed early this year and requires breathalyzers installed in cars of people convicted of a DUI to be equipped with GPS technology. This will allow officials to keep track of cars when they're turned on, requiring a breath test or if someone tries to skip a test — but won't continuously track. For food safety, permits will now be needed to prepare food on site at Farmers Markets because of SB1049. The goal is for everyone to use improved methods for things like food prep, temp control and disposal. As for the big topic of gun safety, several bills passed during the special session on school safety in August which includes strengthening TBI background checks, \$50 million to mental health facilities and \$30 million to state colleges for security upgrades. Also part of that session, another law passed that's new but went into effect last month which makes the purchase of firearm devices such as safe storage equipment be sales tax-free.
